

Imperative Sentence:

When a sentence expresses an order, request, command or suggestion, it is called imperative sentence. It ends with a full stop (.)

Example:

- a. Please give me a glass of water. (Request)
- b. Take rest. (Order)
- c. Don't talk. (Order)
- d. Let's walk outside. (Suggestion)
- e. Let's go for a picnic. (Suggestion)

Exercise – 1

Exclamatory Sentence:

When a sentence expresses strong feeling, it is called exclamatory sentence. It ends with an exclamation mark (!).

Example:

- a. What a nice flower it is!
- b. Hurrah! We have won the game! [Hurrah expresses the feeling of joy.]
- c. Alas! He failed in the exam! [Alas expresses the feeling of sorrow.]
- d. How beautiful you are!
- e. Wow! It's a wonderful idea! [Wow expresses the feeling of wonder.]

Exercise – 2
