Topic: Sentence (Statement, Question, Request)

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• Statement

Definition:

A sentence is a word or group of words that must expresses a complete idea or sense or meaning and that may consists of a subject and a verb.

Example:

- We practice English every day. (Here we is subject, practice is verb, English is object and everyday is adverb)

A **statement** is a sentence that says something is true, like "Pizza is delicious."

- He runs.
- She sings.
- I like climbing.
- Fran is sad.
- My cat is black.
- Dogs are cute.
- He is eight years old.
- The sky is blue.



- Interrogative Sentence (question)
- Is it safe?
- Interrogative sentences ask questions.
- An interrogative sentence asks a direct question and is punctuated at the end with a question mark.

form	function	example
auxiliary verb + subject + verb	ask a question	Does Mary like John?

Here are some examples of yes/no interrogative sentences:

- Is it cold outside?
- Are you feeling better?
- Was the film good?
- Did you like it?
- Does it taste good?
- What is your name?
- What's the time?
- Where is the toilet please?
- Where shall we go?
- How do you open this?



• Request

Request means to ask for something.

These are the three most common ways for making requests:

"Could you open the door for me, please?"

"Would you mind opening the door for me, please?"

"Can you open the door for me, please?

"Can I use your computer, please?"

"Could I borrow some money from you, please?"

"Do you mind if I turn up the heating?"

"Would you mind if I turned up the heating?"
