Conjunction

Conjunction is a word used to connect clauses or sentences or to coordinate words in the same clause.

Examples of Conjunctions

In the following examples, the conjunctions are in bold for easy recognition:

- I tried to hit the nail *but* hit my thumb instead.
- I have two goldfish *and* a cat.
- You can have peach ice cream *or* a brownie sundae.

<u>And</u>

- used to connect words or parts of sentences.
 - a) Give me bread <u>and</u> butter.
 - b) Sue <u>and</u> I left early.
 - c) Do it slowly <u>and</u> carefully.
 - d) Can he read <u>and</u> write?
 - e) She bought apples <u>and</u> bananas.

<u>But</u>

- **but** for contrast
- a) I eat cake, but I never eat biscuits.
- b) I speak French but I've never been to France.
- c) I'd like to go, <u>but</u> I don't have any money.
- d) Ana loves oranges, <u>but</u> she hates pears.
- e) Tom ran, <u>but</u> he missed the bus.

<u>Or</u>

- or before an alternative
- a) Would you like cake <u>or</u> biscuits with your coffee?
- b) We can have a holiday, <u>or</u> we can save our money.
- c) Can we have a picnic, <u>or</u> is the weather too bad?
- d) You can have the blue pen <u>or</u> the red pen.
- e) Can we have a picnic, <u>or</u> is the weather too bad?
